Message from our Principal

14th September 2021

Kia ora koutou,

The Prime Minister confirmed in yesterday evening's announcement that Auckland will remain in Level 4 until Tuesday 21st September at 11:59pm. The government has made an "in principle" decision to move Auckland down alert levels at this time and will confirm this during Tuesday's announcement next week.

Planning for Level 3

In Alert Level 3, schools will partially open. There will be a plan in place to allow some students to attend school, however, students should continue to remain learning at home if they are able. There will be NO before or after school care at Level 3. The approach to learning will be consistent whether children are at home or school. The Prime Minister was very clear in her message - "if you can keep your children at home, do so". Our wonderful teaching team will continue to plan for and post distance learning each day for your child to continue accessing learning at home. If you are an essential worker and there is no other parent/caregiver at home during the day with your child, then they may attend school for distance learning during Alert Level 3. Students must not come to school if they are unwell. At this stage, based on the survey responses, we are planning for a low number of students to return.

Thank you to the 207 families who responded to the survey to support us with our planning. The survey is now closed. If your survey response changes between now and when we open for Alert Level 3 please email me immediately carla@pinehill.school.nz

We will have very few staff onsite to supervise during Alert Level 3 and we do need to adhere to the Ministry of Education and government guidelines of keeping bubbles to ten. We are unable to take students who we have not been notified about.

As we continue Level 4 lockdown in Auckland...remember Lockdown is tough on everyone.

We all have some days that are better than others.

Look after yourself.

Get exercise each day.

Offer to help others in your bubble. Be kind to yourself and others. Do something you enjoy. If you feel that you need support or guidance, tell someone who can help. It is good to remember that by staying in lockdown we are helping to keep ourselves, our friends and are whānau safe.
